Introduction

This compendium starts with Helga von Schweinitz trip to Germany in 1990. One of the main purposes of the trip was to establish a "Sister City" relationship between Koblenz Germany and Austin Texas. This relationship was the accumulation of years of work between delegations from Austin and Koblenz.

The delegation left Austin Texas on 21 September 1990 to fly to Frankfurt Germany. They did business and tourists things in Frankfurt until 25 September 1990. Then the delegation traveled to Koblenz for more business and tourist events. On 28 September 1990, the delegation traveled back to Austin Texas.

Helga stayed in Germany and went to visit family in her home town of Herford. Then she returned to Koblenz to celebrate the Re-unification of Germany festival. There after she began her journey back to Texas.

Full details of this trip are in "Helga's Koblenz Album September 1990" which includes the delegation's trip to Frankfurt, Koblenz, and Helga's trip to Herford.

The section about the trip in Koblenz is a repeat of the entries in the Album. It begins with the itinerary for the Major of Austin, Lee Cooke. Then combines Helga's diary notes and with the photo and their captions. Helga's diary has been edited to only include items that pertain to the delegation. The whole diary is included in her Album.


After the delegations return to Austin, Helga submitted an article to the American Statesman and it was actually published twice, one in December 1990 and again in March 1991.




Map of Koblenz and Frankfurt




Helga drew this map to simplify the relationship between the cities. In 1990, the capital of unified Germany was still Bonn. It returned to Berlin in 1999.




The ceremony was actually on 25th of September 1990.




Itinerary for Mayor Cooke for entire trip Koblenz and Frankfurt




Friday 21 September 1990

Left on Delta 3pm. On the flight were Mayor Lee Cooke & Barbara, Don & Renata van Stones, Mary Allen Kocura, Elbert Marcom. Mr & Mrs Cooke flew business class, paid for by Austin-American Socity. He was in jeans which is remarkable only because Renata van Stone had advised against it.


faction in the city council (Ingrid). It was late when we finally were bused home. Food (buffet style, Eisbombe mit Raketen, etc) had been more than great.

They served a rustic dinner without forks, knives or spoons (turkey legs from Texas as main course). Lots of beer & wine. Great time. On the way down the hill Renate A and Renate van Stone, Pat Berg and I hooked arms and marched signing German Wanderlieder, loud and much too happy. We were inspired by the musicians that had entertained in the castle. We sang in German to make sure the "Amis" would not be blamed by the disturbed towns people. (it was almost midnight).



Bus to Deinhart, Sekt und wine mit Führung und Proben. Man trank aus jedem der 7 Gläser nur 1 Schluck and goβ den Rest in einen Apfallnapf. (You only drank 1 sip from each of the 7 glasses and poured the rest into an apple bowl.)

Nachmittags zum Stadtrat. Ich übersetzte offiziell für einen Beamten, der uns vorher über das Vewaltungs system unterrichtete.

Beim Stadtrat (die treffen sich mur ~10 mail im Jahr, haben aber 50 Abreordnete), ging es geränschvoll zu. Nach unserer Begniβung wurde es für die meisten von uns longweilig, zumal wir alle totmüde waren (mir war es nich langweilig).

Schnell zum HOtel, aufs Klo, dann im Bus zur Festung, wo wir vom Prasidenten des Rhein Pf. Landtages empglangen wurden. Man traf wieder (nun schon) bekannte Leute; es gab Gulaschsuppen und Schmittchen, Wein, Sekt, Reden. Veronika Lebbesie lad sich ein, bei ihr zu wohnen, wenn ich nächste Woche wieder nach Koblenz komme. Ich erhielt auch hintenrum eine Eintrittskarte zur Ehrentribühne für die Feierlichkeiten am 2,3 Oktober.

Dann zum Brauereikeller für ein letztes gemütliches Beisammersein. Oberbürgermeister kam auch. Eigentlich was ein Theater besuch geplant (Die heilige Johanna) aber das wäre ja schrecklich langweilig gewesen für Leute, die kein Deutsch verstehen. Der

Plan wurde kurzfristig abjeändert. We talked about (Elbert's idea) to have an exchange of theachers for we exchanged kids.

Mayor Cooke told me that he would put me in charge of the project to plant 1,000,000 trees in Aust by 1992 (or 1993?). This followed a remark I had made the day before that the Austinites love of trees might be second to that of the German's love for trees. I hope he was joking, but nevertheless I had immediate volunteers.

Friday 29 September 1990

Everybody departs or will depart after a day of rest. Cookes were taken to Frankfurt airport at 6:30am, still exhausted.

At breakfast Don van Stone commented that our group was so congenial, that we could actually go on an Amazon cruise together. This is really amazing since most of us had never or hardly met before.

I left Koblenz for Herford Germany by train at 10:08am, but like so many trains now a days, it was date. (DM 72).

Going to stay in Herford until Monday.

Back in Koblenz for Fest der Einheit, 2 Oct 1990

Monday 1 October 1990 Train back to Koblenz. Veronika Leggewie picked me up. I am staying at her place.

Tuesday 2 October 1990

Evening was reserved for the big event.: The celebration and festivities concerning reunification. Renate Anderson, Veronika, her Mother and I strolled the few hundred yards to the Deutsche Eck at around 8:30pm. Crowds made it difficult for us to reach the Denkmal area where we had tickets from the Landtags president Volkert in a roped off area. There were all kinds of dignitaries there, O. B., Vokart, Minister president, etc. Renate and I made sure we were seen and recognized by many. TV cameras and lights. Loud rock music was played live until almost a quarter to 12, the young crowd clapped and moved in rhythm, but many would have preferred and expected a different

type of music. Then several dignitaries said a few sentences into loud speakers, but no speaker was directed towards the invited guests, so we couldn't hear them. Then the five flags of the new states (formerly DDR) were hissed with applause. The "Einigkeit und Recht und Freiheit" verse of the national anthem was played by an army band and solemnly sung by everybody - and that was it, except for a meager firework from the Festung Ehrenbreitstein. What happened to the schwarz-rot-gold flag that - we had been told by many - would be ceremoniously lowered because form Bundespräsident Heuß had put it there once "until Germany is reunited". The flag was not lowered. Was it the mechanism that didn't work? We never found out, wondered about it for a minute, and one talked about plans for Sunday afternoon, the weather, and the price of rice in China, sto to say. No big enthusiasm. Only drunks sang fractions of the Deutschland Deutschland, etc. There was no closing hours for Bars that night, all of them were filled into the streets until early morning. A few men and kids had been around with a flag.


This flag was supposed to come down at midnight, but it didn't. But the flags of the 5 new states were pulled down again.

Two sisters of Ernie were there, several other relatives. Kaffee, Kuchen, Erzählen, Tränen der Alten Damen. I took a few pictures.

Prospective 'sister city' is rich in visitor appeal

If plans develop as hoped for by hardworking groups of people in both towns, Austin will soon have a sister city in

Germany: Koblenz.
Sister city relationships between American and foreign cities are regulated by federal and local authorities. In Austin, they have to be based on citizen

PUBLIC FORUM initiative and not be funded by tax dollars.
At no expense to Austin taxpayers, May-

or Lee Cooke and almost two dozen citizens of various walks of life spent three days in Koblenz in September. They met with city and state officials, representatives of industry and trade, with cultural groups and representatives of educational institutions, and with other citizens.

The lord mayor of Koblenz and other representatives of his city are expected to visit Austin this spring. High school students and teachers, a choir and a jazz band are among those already booking flights to Texas hoping to find host fam-ilies to stay with. The Graduate School of Business at UT has for years been accepting students from the Koblenz area in its program. The Board of Trade in Koblenz has expressed an interest in hosting 30 vocational students from Austin in German families for a few

The German word for sister city translates into "partner city," which characterizes the expected relationship: both sides have to work to make the relationship viable, valuable and enjoyable.

Just as few people in Koblenz know a lot about Austin, few Austinites know Koblenz. But those who do, agree that Koblenz is fun to visit.

Koblenz lies less than 100 miles northwest of Frankfurt/Main at the confluence of the Mosel River and the Rhine in the heart of Germany's wine region. It can be reached by autobahn or on country roads, but also quite easily by rail. You catch a train right at the Frankfurt airport and whisk to Koblenz without a transfer.

Its location suggests that you make Koblenz your headquarters for as many day trips as your schedule allows. You might take a boat ride on the most beautiful stretch of the Rhine with its castles, vineyards, the legendary rock of the Lorelei and pretty towns competing for your attention.

On "Inter City" trains you can be in

Bonn, Cologne or Mainz in less than an hour. Many Texans with German ances-tors find their origin in this region, which includes the former duchy of Hessen-Nassau with the little town of Braunfels

You might not want to take any day trips once you have begun to explore Koblenz proper and its immediate vi-

cinity.

Although Koblenz has more than 100,000 citizens, the heart of town and the historical district are also home to most shopping facilities, parks, museums and many residents.

The strategic importance of Koblenz on two major rivers has brought wealth and destruction to the town. The Romans were there, of course, so were the Swedes, the Spanish, the French and the Americans (in WWI and WWII).

In 1944, Allied bombs destroyed 75 percent of the city, but you'll find that hard to believe since reconstruction was undertaken with great skill, love for the original designs and financial investment.

Since Koblenz is popular all through the year and hosts conventions, many sport competitions and trade fairs, a choosy visitor or groups should book ac-commodations well in advance.

Prices for hotel rooms are downright decent when compared to what some in-ternational hotels in Europe extract from their guests. Top of the line, pricewise, (with \$1 = DM1.50) include the Scandic Crown Hotel, up to \$140 per person/night; and the traditional German style Hotel Diehl just across the river, up to \$90 per person; both have telex, fax and conference rooms.

No visit to Koblenz is complete without a Spaziergang through the parks along the "Deutsches Eck", a piece of land protruding into the Mosel and the Rhine where they come together. Having enjoyed centuries of historic distinction for a number of reasons, it has now a colossal pedestal standing there which looks like it should have some statue on top of it. Well, until 1945 it had a statue of Kaiser Wilhelm I. But then an American general took offense of the old Kaiser and had him shot to smithereens. Only the imperial head survived the ordeal and is displayed in one of the fine


The citizens of Koblenz are now divided over the question of whether to have a replica of the old statue made and placed on the Deutsches Eck or not.



Austin – Koblenz By Helga von Schweinitz

If plans develop as hoped for by hard working groups of people in both towns, Austin will soon have a sister city in Germany: Koblenz.

Sister city relationships between American and foreign cities are regulated by federal and local authorities. In Austin they have to be based on citizen initiative and not be funded by tax dollars.

At no expense to Austin tax payers, Mayor Lee Cooke and almost two dozen citizens of various walks of life spent three days in Koblenz last September. They met with city and state dignitaries, representatives of industry and trade, with cultural groups and educational institutions, and with other citizens looking forward to a partnership with the capital of Texas.

The Lord Mayor of Koblenz and other representatives of his city are expected to visit Austin this spring. High school students and teachers, a choir and a jazz band are among those already booking flights to Texas hoping to find host families to stay with. The Graduate School of Business at UT has for years been enjoying students from the Koblenz area in its program. The Board of Trade in Koblenz has expressed an interest in hosting 30

vocational students from Austin in German families for a few weeks.

The German word for sister city translates into "partner city", which characterizes the expected relationship: both sides have to work to make the relationship viable, valuable and enjoyable.

Just as few people in Koblenz know a lot about Austin. few Austinites know Koblenz, but those who do, agree that Koblenz is Fun to Visit.

You'll find two endearing features in Koblenz just by looking at its city map and at a map of Germany: Koblenz is close to many other interesting places, and while you are in the town, you can walk to almost anything you want to see there.

Koblenz lies less than a hundred miles northwest of Frankfurt/Main at the confluence of the lovely Mosel river and the mighty Rhine in the heart of Germany's wine region. It can be reached by Autobahn or on scenic country roads, but also quite easily by rail. You catch a train right at the Frankfurt airport and whisk to the Hauptbahnhof in Koblenz without a transfer.

Its location suggests that you unpack your suitcases and make Koblenz your headquarter for as many day trips as your schedule allows. You might take a boat ride

on the most beautiful stretch of the Rhine with its castles, vineyards, the legendary rock of the Lorelei and pretty towns competing for your attention. A ride on the Mosel includes the thrill of going through several locks.

On "Inter City" trains you can be in Bonn, Cologne or Mainz in less than an hour. (A Saturday morning in Mainz should include at least an hour on the market held near the Dom (cathedral). The towns of Trier, Wetzlar and Limburg are among the popular destinations, but leisurely drives through the wine villages or into the mountain areas are rather relaxing if you take the time for a tour through a castle or a Spaziergang (stroll) in the park of a spa and, of course, if you stop in a Cafe in the afternoon zum Kaffee (for coffee and cake). Many Texans with German ancestors find their origin in this region which includes the former duchy of Hessen-Nassau with the little town of Braunfels.

You might not want to take any day trips once you have begun to explore Koblenz proper and its immediate vicinity. Wear comfortable shoes for that, because any respectable old town has its share of cobble stones, and being well heeled means being well sneakered.

Although Koblenz has now over a hundred thousand citizens, the heart of town and the historical district are also home to most shopping facilities, parks, museums, and many residents. This harmonic combination of the

past and today's life gives you an immediate sense of being a pearl on the long string of people playing their role in history, by just being there.

The strategic importance of Koblenz on two major rivers has brought wealth and destruction to the town. The Romans were there, of course, so were the Swedes, the Spanish, the French and the Americans (in WW I and WW II).

In 1964 allied bombs destroyed 75% of the city, but you'll find that hard to believe since reconstruction was undertaken with great skill, love for the original designs and financial investment.

A guided walking tour (available in English) can be arranged. It would give you an introduction and take you into some nooks and crannies you might otherwise miss. A good tour book lets you take it all in at your own speed since you might want to enhance your appreciation of Gothic arches with intermittent sampling of local libations offered in cozy wine and beer taverns. Or you might want to sit and rest for a while in the open air section of a restaurant and do some people watching while you eat yet another Schnitzel.

Those with an interest in the different periods of ecclesiastical and secular architecture find beautiful samples to study. The St. Kastor Kirche (St. Castor's

Church), a triple naved Romanesque basilica, was consecrated in 836 A.D. and completed in its present form in the 12th century.

The Liebfrauenkirche (Church of Our Lady) elegantly combines Romanesque, Gothic and Baroque styles and is easily recognized by its domed Zwiebel (onion) towers. In the Church of St. Florin one is struck by the beauty of its windows, while the Jesuit Church features a fine sample of a rose window.

Among the worldly structures of old are the Alte Burg (old castle), the Kurfuerstliches Schloss (Palace of the Prince Elector) and the Deutscher Kaiser, a "residential tower" with late Gothic arches, said to be a popular meeting place of friends who enjoy a good glass of wine together.

Most of the charm of strolling through the Altstadt (old town) of Koblenz comes from the little surprises in the shape of modern and old statues, fountains, picture perfect bay windows, house fronts covered with vines, an organ grinder, and from the eye-catching displays in the store windows (window shopping is understandably a favorite pastime of locals and visitors). At the entrance to the pedestrian area at Loehrstrasse you find all four houses of the intersection showing off an oriel turret, each one different, which your camera will not be able to resist.

Many of the old, venerable buildings are now owned by the City of Koblenz. Some are used as offices, others continue their splendid past with receptions, banquets and similar occasions where ambiance is of some consequence.

Shopping is made tempting - even with today's low purchasing power of the Dollar - in the traffic free district with easy access to major department stores, a downtown mall (Loehr-Center) and the countless specialty shops ranging from sex boutiques to fashion to china.

One should not be on a diet while in Germany. Most of the pubs offer tasty meals and snacks with specialties of the region and the season. There are many of each in Koblenz. In the fall you have to have a glass (no more than two) of Federweissen (the young wine which is still cloudy) accompanied by a hefty piece of Zwiebelkuchen (onion cake).

To get the best view of Koblenz and the confluence of the Mosel and Rhine, you should pick a clear day and cross the Rhine by bridge or ferry and walk or chair-lift up to the Festung Ehrenbreitstein, the biggest and strongest fortress ever built by the Prussians. From this vantage point a firework display is launched every year on they second week-end in August as the highlight - so

to speak - to the "Rhein in Flammen" festival (Rhine in Flames). This well rehearsed spectacle draws more than half a million tourists into the region when several miles of the Rhine with its romantic shores are illuminated.

Since Koblenz is popular all through the year and hosts conventions, many sport competitions and trade fairs, a choosy visitor or groups should book accommodations well in advance. Prices for hotel rooms are downright decent when compared to what some international hotels in Europe extract from their guests. Top of the line, price-wise, (with \$1 = DMl.5O) include the Scandic Crown Hotel with up to \$140.- per person/night, and the traditional German style Hotel Diehl just across the river with up to \$90 per person; both have telex, fax and conference rooms.

However, there is many a comfortable bed to sleep in offered by a Gasthaus, Pension or small hotel for as low as \$20 a night.

Most prices quoted in brochures include taxes and service charge but usually not the use of a wash cloth (Pack your own).

And then, for the young at heart, there is the youth hostel in the Ehrenbreitstein Fortress. All ages are welcomed there for even less money, and you can have a two or four bed private room. You can even partake in

the afternoon meal of Kaffee und Kuchen up there which is not considered too bourgeois, nor for sedentary folks only.

No visit to Koblenz is complete without a Spaziergang through the parks along the "Deutsches Eck", a piece of land protruding into the Mosel and the Rhine where they come together. Having enjoyed centuries of historic distinction for a number of reasons, it has now a colossal pedestal standing there which looks like it should have some statue on top of it. Well, until 1945 it had Kaiser Wilhelm I up there, complete with Bart (beard) and horse. But then an American general took offense of the old Kaiser and had him shot to smithereens. Only the imperial head survived the ordeal and is displayed in one of the fine museums. The citizens of Koblenze are now divided over the question of whether to have a replica of the old statue made and placed on the Deutsches Eck or not. In the meantime, the German flag is weathering time in its place on the pedestal just above the flags of the now 16 states of the new Germany.

To Kaiser or not to Kaiser... if you get to Koblenz before the Kaiser does, you might want to ask the guy next to you in the wine tavern about his opinion on this monumental dispute. He might then tell you of many other things of interest to him or you in Koblenz that were not mentioned in this little article.
