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
## Album 1990 Koblenz Photo Compendium Introduction







This compendium begins with the itinerary for the Major of Austin, Lee Cooke. Then combines Helga's diary notes and with the photo and their captions.











Itinerary based on original, but modified by Chamber of Commerce in Koblenz

Friday 21 September 1990

Left on Delta 3pm. On the flight were Mayor Lee Cooke & Barbara, Don & Renata van Stones, Mary Allen Kocura, Elbert Marcom. Mr & Mrs Cooke flew business class, paid for by Austin-American Socity. He was in jeans which is remarkable only because Renata van Stone had advised against it.

### Saturday 22 September 1990

Arrived in Frankfurt at 9:30am next morning, welcomed by Delta representative, some trouble with late luggage. Mary Ellen and I in Renate Anderson's car to Hotel Intercontinental. First Renate could not find her car, then we got lost in Frankfurt's traffic.

Room DM 245.- for single person. (\$1 = 1.53DM) Terrible price, breakfast not included. Across the street is the Intercontinental where restaurant prices are a little lower, still awful.

Had beer and lunch with Bert & Mary Ellen, then tried to sleep. No luck. At 6pm had a cup of Keinchen coffee in hotel, 8DM. At around 7pm all seven of us met up with Lothar & Julie Regenbogen, friends of the van Stones. He is a Lufthansa pilot.

By taxi to Sachsenhausen, where streets were packed (!) with people due to a Straßen fest. We fought our way through to "Gemaltes Haus", a nice restaurant. Managed to get a table, ordered "genischte Platte" to sample all kinds of meat. Then rambled on to the Alte Brickenmühle" where we had dessert, all impromptu. Until midnight we then strolled through the streets of Sachsenhausen, all bussing with life. Major Cooke always broke away from the group and looked into bars, pubs, Laundromats; everything caught his interest. He had spent the afternoon in a museum studying Frankfurter's history.

Sunday 23 September 1990 Continental breakfast (14DM). Then talk by Professor Fried of EEC about EEC, sponsored by the Texas Department of Commerce. Afternoon Elbert, Mary Ellen and I walked through Frankfurt. Had lunch in "König in Salzhaus" near the closed Goethehaus. Excellent Saltbar. visited Dom, Paulkirche, Alte Oper and the many pedestrian areas, especially the Römer, which is beautifully restored with all the medieval houses.

So many people were crowing the restaurants and cafes. It was overcast, beautiful to walk.

Evening we, as a group, took taxis to Sachsenhausen again, had dinner in the Alte Brückenmühle, strolled around again for several hours.

Stumbled into a "Texas Bar" with a Texan owner called Cook. Mayor Cooke promised him a care-package from Austin with Austin mementos to add to all the Texas decorations in the joint.

We took the subway to the Hauptbahnhof, everything just for the experience. Smooth ride, clean, but at the Hauptbahnhof there were some shady charackters, bums, drunks, addicts, a sorry sight, come asked us for money. This walking around in a group (we were joined by some Aggies from the Department of Commerce) was fun.

Bus to Deinhart, Sekt und wine mit Führung und Proben. Man trank aus jedem der 7 Gläser nur 1 Schluck and goβ den Rest in einen Apfallnapf. (You only drank 1 sip from each of the 7 glasses and poured the rest into an apple bowl.)

Nachmittags zum Stadtrat. Ich übersetzte offiziell für einen Beamten, der uns vorher über das Vewaltungs system unterrichtete.

Beim Stadtrat (die treffen sich mur ~10 mail im Jahr, haben aber 50 Abreordnete), ging es geränschvoll zu. Nach unserer Begniβung wurde es für die meisten von uns longweilig, zumal wir alle totmüde waren (mir war es nich langweilig).

Schnell zum HOtel, aufs Klo, dann im Bus zur Festung, wo wir vom Prasidenten des Rhein Pf. Landtages empglangen wurden. Man traf wieder (nun schon) bekannte Leute; es gab Gulaschsuppen und Schmittchen, Wein, Sekt, Reden. Veronika Lebbesie lad sich ein, bei ihr zu wohnen, wenn ich nächste Woche wieder nach Koblenz komme. Ich

erhielt auch hintenrum eine Eintrittskarte zur Ehrentribühne für die Feierlichkeiten am 2,3 Oktober.

Dann zum Brauereikeller für ein letztes gemütliches Beisammersein. Oberbürgermeister kam auch. Eigentlich was ein Theater besuch geplant (Die heilige Johanna) aber das wäre ja schrecklich langweilig gewesen für Leute, die kein Deutsch verstehen. Der Plan wurde kurzfristig abjeändert. We talked about (Elbert's idea) to have an exchange of theachers for we exchanged kids.

Mayor Cooke told me that he would put me in charge of the project to plant 1,000,000 trees in Aust by 1992 (or 1993?). This followed a remark I had made the day before that the Austinites love of trees might be second to that of the German's love for trees. I hope he was joking, but nevertheless I had immediate volunteers.

A visit to the family of Ernie Günther in Koblenz





Everybody departs or will depart after a day of rest. Cookes were taken to Frankfurt airport at 6:30am, still exhausted.

At breakfast Don van Stone commented that our group was so congenial, that we could actually go on an Amazon cruise together. This is really amazing since most of us had never or hardly met before.

Left Koblenz by train at 10:08am, but like so many trains now a days, it was date. (DM 72).

Inge picked me up at Herforder Bahnhof. Stayed in Herford at Diethard's house until Monday. Onkel Otto, Ralph & Barbara were there too. Had dinner with them at Schinkenikrug.

Sunday in Kurpark and Palmengarten Bad Pyrmonth. Wonderful trees and landscaping!

#### Monday 1 October 1990

Train to Koblenz. Veronika Leggewie picked me up. I am staying at her place. Her apartment is centrally located, all rooms are spacious, ceilings high, quiet heat, bit windows, so much better than our average house in the US. Afternoon Stadtlummul with coffee & cake in Cafe, evenings Rigoletto. The Koblenz theater is very pretty, light colors and decor, not big. The opera was done in German, but Rigoletto sang Italian because he was a quick substitute (an American, Wayne ...) they got from Heidelberg. He sang better than all others, except for Ri's daughter. In Koblenz you can walk everywhere, nice town.

Friday 29 September 1990





Tuesday 2 October 1990

Veronika taught (Realschule) until 1pm. I spent some time shopping (mostly looking) but mostly in the Landeshauptarchiv. I had to be met by some higher up archivist first who questioned me about how I had heard of their holdings of Texan-German files. Finally he ordered 4 files to be brought to me (I had to come back later). They were in terrible brittle condition but contained precious material (see extra notes). Afternoon with Renate Anderson. To Mr Stallknicht in Mühlheim-Kärsche (?), Kaffee, Kuche, andere Gäste, doller Neubau, zur Besprechung seines Märnerchors bezuglich deren Besuch in Texas im kommendeen Jahr. 65 Sänger & Frauen u.s.w. 165 Persönen. Ein groβeres Projekt für uns - Burse Unterbringung etc. Evening was reserved for the big event.: The celebration and festivities concerning reunification.

Renate Anderson, Veronika, her Mother and I strolled the few hundred yards to the Deutsche Eck at around 8:30pm. Crowds made it difficult for us to reach the Denkmal area where we had tickets from the Landtags

president Volkert in a roped off area. There were all kinds of dignitaries there, O. B., Vokart, Minister president, etc. Renate and I made sure we were seen and recognized by many. TV cameras and lights. Loud rock music was played live until almost a quarter to 12, the young crowd clapped and moved in rhythm, but many would have preferred and expected a different type of music. Then several dignitaries said a few sentences into lour speakers, but no speaker was directed towards the invited guests, so we couldn't hear them. Then the five flags of the new states (formerly DDR) were hissed with applause. The "Einigkeit und Recht und Freiheit" verse of the national anthem was played by an army band and solemnly sung by everybody - and that was it, except for a meager firework from the Festung Ehrenbreitstein. What happened to the schwarz-rot-gold flag that - we had been told by many - would be ceremoniously lowered because form Bundespräsident Heuß had put it there once "until Germany is reunited". The flag was not lowered. Was it the mechanism that didn't work? We never found out, wondered about it for a minute, and one talked about plans for Sunday afternoon, the weather, and the price of rice in China, sto to say. No big enthusiasm. Only drunks sang fractions of the Deutschland Deutschland, etc. There was no closing hours for Bars that night, all of them were filled into the streets until early morning. A few men and kids had been around with a flag.


This flag was supposed to come down at midnight, but it didn't. But the flags of the 5 new states were pulled down again.

Wednesday 3 October 1990 Feiertag, everything closed.

Alfred Bur picked me up at 10am. His mother is one of Ernie Guenther's sisters. I had called them a few days earlier to deliver greetings from Ernie, who is too sick by now to write or phone. Two sisters of Ernie were there, several other relatives. Kaffee, Kuchen, Erzählen, Tränen der Alten Damen. I took a few pictures. Distance is a terrible concept when one gets too old to travel.

Lunch mit Veronika outside in blazing sunshine in a restaurant on one of the many beautiful squares. Afternoon with Veronika to Neuwrech (fast!!!) to performance of "Bürger musizieren", wunderschöne Lieder (Schubert etc). Abends, meeting at Veronika's Haus mit Frau Brudermanns und Frau Steinbach zwicks Lehrer, bzw, Schüleraustausch. They talked mainly about personal or their student related subjects. I had a hard time returning then to planned subject. They stayed till ~1am.


#### Thursday 4 October 1990

Spent several hours in Hauptlandesarchive with the files on emigration. Ordered some "micros" (70 Pfg pro Stück) to be mailed to me. Possible articles to be written, Sehr behilfliche Leute. Had the worst day of a bad cold.

Around 1pm Veronika took me to the train for Mainz, where Uschi picked me up. Kaffee, Kuche, Erzählen. Alexandra is almost my height, Christian was on a school trip. Evenings Mischi took us to an Italian restaurant in Gonsenheim, very good. Uschi said they watched the owner make a payment to the Mafia.


